Policy and Legislative Updates

WH and HHS Unveil Initiatives to Address SDOH and Advance Health Equity

- The White House is introducing the <u>U.S. Playbook to Address Social Determinants of</u>
 <u>Health</u>, the nation's first-ever comprehensive guide in this domain.
- Simultaneously, HHS is releasing a <u>Call to Action to Address Health Related Social</u>
 <u>Needs</u> and a <u>Medicaid and CHIP Health-Related Social Needs Framework</u>.
- The Playbook showcases ongoing and new efforts by various federal agencies, including HHS, USDA, HUD, VA, EPA, and others, to improve individuals' social circumstances and enhance health outcomes.
- The Medicaid and CHIP Health-Related Social Needs Framework aims to guide states in developing programs that address housing and nutritional insecurity for high-need populations
- The Call to Action encourages cross-sector collaborations to build a more integrated health and social care system

HHS Releases 2022 National Survey on Drug Use and Health Data

- The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), through the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) released the results of the 2022 National Survey on Drug Use and Health (NSDUH).
- The survey itself provides nationally representative data on the self-reported use of tobacco, alcohol, and illicit drugs; substance use disorders; mental health conditions; suicidal thoughts and behaviors; and substance use and mental health treatment.
- Key Takeaways Include:
- 1 in 4 adults aged 18 or older reported having a mental illness within the past year.
 - 1 in 8 adolescents had serious thoughts of suicide in the past year.

HHS Launches Plan to Address Language Barriers to Accessing Health Care and Human Services

- The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) <u>released</u> the
 <u>HHS Language Access Plan</u> to enhance access to life-saving services for
 individuals with Limited English Proficiency (LEP) and disabilities.
- The plan extends beyond language access to include communication and accessibility requirements for individuals with disabilities under Sections 504 and 508 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973.
- It provides guidance for HHS divisions to develop specific language access plans, encouraging data collection for improved access.
- The plan is the product of the Department-wide Language Access
 Steering Committee which was relaunched last year to bolster language access across HHS.

Senate Finance Committee Holds Markup on Better Mental Health Care, Lower-Cost Drugs and Extenders Act

- Senate Committee on Finance <u>held a markup</u> on "Open Executive Session to consider an original bill entitled the Better Mental Health Care, Lower-Cost Drugs, and Extenders Act."
- The committee also communicated the key considerations for improving mental health accessibility, specifically noting their interest in improving the number of mental health providers for the youth.
- Discussed their interest in bringing telehealth and mental health services to primary care facilities to improve Americans' abilities to find the care they need

Senate Finance Committee Releases Discussion Draft on Mental Health and PBM Reform

- Senate Finance Committee Chair Ron Wyden (D-Ore.), and Ranking Member Mike Crapo (R-Idaho) <u>released</u> a discussion draft including policies aimed at expanding mental health care under Medicaid and Medicare and reducing prescription drug costs for seniors.
- The committee intends to advance these legislative proposals, in addition to pharmacy benefit manager (PBM) reforms previously <u>passed out of</u> <u>Committee in July</u>, Key provisions include:
- -Expanding the number of mental health and substance use providers participating in Medicare
- -Expanding the use of licensed clinical social workers (LCSWs and occupational therapists under Medicare.
- -Improving access to Medicare mental health services delivered through telehealth.

Improving Measurements for Loneliness and Isolation Act Support Letter

Improving Measurements for Loneliness and Isolation Act

- U.S. Representatives Mike Flood (R-NE) and David Trone (D-MD)
 <u>introduced</u> the <u>Improving Measurements for Loneliness and Isolation</u>
 <u>Act of 2023</u> (<u>one-pager</u>)
- The bill would establish a working group that would develop standardized measures for loneliness and isolation, which would include representatives from several federal agencies
- There is a Senate companion bill (<u>S. 3260</u>) that has been introduced and referred to the HELP Committee.
- The Coalition applauds these initiatives and will be circulating a letter of support for members to sign.
